The USU Psychology Community Clinic provides professional services to the residents of Northern Utah, Southern Idaho, and Western Wyoming, as well as students and staff of Utah State University:

- The **Purpose** of the clinic is to serve as the primary mental health service and training site for graduate students studying clinical, counseling, and school psychology.

- **Services** are provided by graduate students completing their MSs or PhDs These students are supervised by licensed PhD psychology faculty.
- **Fees** for services are based on a modest sliding schedule and determined by the monthly take-home pay of clients and the number of persons in the family. The clinic is a participating provider with Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Utah. For other insurance companies, an itemized summary of services is provided. This information may be submitted by the client to obtain reimbursement.

The Mission of the Student Health Service is to provide basic medical care with outpatient, primary care, pharmacy, laboratory and health education services to the students at Utah State University in a convenient environment. The Student Health Center provides a convenient and cost-effective resource for health care for students at Utah State University. A staff of physicians and advanced-level providers (FNP and PA) is supported by a well-trained staff of nurses, pharmacists, a laboratory technologist, and a health educator to provide care for day-to-day illness, first aid, and to monitor and provide care for more chronic illness, should the need arise. Additionally, the Health Center has responsibility for administering the Student Health Insurance Policy.

The Student Health and Wellness Center provides comprehensive women's health exams and information. There are two primary care providers who specialize in women's health issues. Linda Roberts, RN, FNP, is a nurse practitioner at the SHWC and Dr. David Kirkman, MD, is a specialist in gynecology, who consults at the SHWC periodically. We provide liquid-based PAP testing, which is more accurate and allows for screening of some other illnesses at the same time. Call 797-1660 for an appointment or to ask any questions.

Math and stats tutors typically represent majors in Math, Math/Stats Education, Statistics, or Engineering. While tutors must demonstrate subject competence, a decision to hire a tutor is heavily weighted on his/her demonstrated genuine enthusiasm to help students learn math and a sincere desire to develop effective tutoring strategies.

We are proud that many of the Center's tutors participate and succeed in a variety of challenging educational experiences, including the USU Putnam Exam Team, engineering conferences and competitions, and scholarship competitions. In fact, in 2003, two math tutors participated in the national Putnam Exam and helped USU place in the top 10% - 46th out of 476 teams. Time Magazine reported the Putnam Exam to be the most prestigious and difficult math test in the world.
